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INDEPENDENT AUDITORS' REPORT

The Members of the East Feliciana Parish School Board Clinton, Louisiana

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the East Feliciana Parish School Board (School Board) as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, which collectively comprise the School Board's basic financial statements as listed in the table of contents. These financial statements are the responsibility of the School Board's management. Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit.

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and , the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free of material misstatement. An audit includes examining, on a test basis, evidence supporting the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. An audit also includes assessing the accounting principles used and significant estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall financial statement presentation. We believe that our audit provides a reasonable basis for our opinion.

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the respective financial position of the governmental activities, each major fund, and the aggregate remaining fund information of the East Feliciana Parish School Board as of June 30, 2010 and the respective changes in financial position for the year then ended in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America require that the management's discussion and analysis and budgetary comparison information on pages III through VIII, pages 26 through 30 and page 31 be presented to supplement the basic financial statements. Such information, although not a part of the basic financial statements, is required by the Governmental Accounting Standards Board, who considers it to be an essential part of financial reporting for placing the basic financial statements in an appropriate operational, economic, or historical context. We have applied certain limited procedures to the required supplementary information in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America, which consistend of inquiries of management about the methods of preparing the information and comparing the information for consistency with management's responses to our inquiries, the basic financial statements, and other knowledge we obtained during our audit of the basic financial statements. We do not express an opinion or provide any assurance on the information because the limited procedures to express an opinion or provide any assurance.

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming opinions on the financial statements that collectively comprise the School Board's financial statements as a whole. The combining non-major fund financial statements are presented for purposes of additional analysis and are not a required part of the financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards is presented for purposes of additional analysis as required by U.S. Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, and is also not a required part of the financial statements. The combining non-major fund financial statements and the schedule of expenditures of federal awards are the responsibility of management and were derived from and relate directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements and certain additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated in all material respects in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

In accordance with Government Auditing Standards, we have also issued our report dated March 12, 2011 on our consideration of the East Feliciana Parish School Board's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the internal control over financial reporting and compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with Government Auditing Standards and should be read in conjunction with this report in considering the results of our audit.

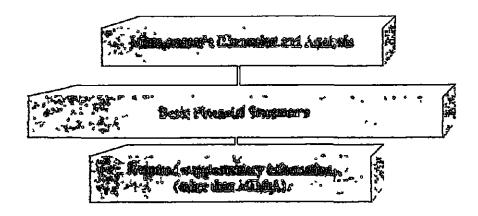
The Management's Discussion and Analysis of the East Fehriana Parish School Board's (the School Board) financial performance presents a narrative overview and analysis of the School Board's financial activities for the year ended June 30, 2010 This document focuses on the current year's activities, resulting changes, and currently known facts in comparison with the prior year's information

FINANCIAL HIGHLIGHTS

- ☆ The East Feliciana Parish School Board's assets exceeded its liabilities at the close of fiscal year 2010 by approximately \$11,074,000
- Expenses exceeded revenues by approximately \$237,000 at the end of the year, indicating a decrease in the financial position of the School Board over prior year
- * State MFP funding decreased by approximately \$651,000 from the prior year
- ☆ The General Fund's fund balance increased from the prior year by approximately \$6,000 due to budgetary adjustments made during 2010
- The Operations and Maintenance Fund, which accounts for the proceeds of a 1% sales tax, has a fund balance of approximately \$1,278,000, which can be used for a variety of operating purposes The School Board has used this fund to provide salary supplements and capital outlay for the past several years

OVERVIEW OF THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The following graphic illustrates the minimum requirements for Special Purpose Governments established by Governmental Accounting Standards Board Statement 34, <u>Basic Financial Statements—and Management's</u> <u>Discussion and Analysis—for State and Local Governments</u>



These financial statements consist of three sections - Management's Discussion and Analysis (this section), the basic financial statements (including the notes to the financial statements), and required supplementary information.

Government-wide financial statements. The government-wide financial statements are designed to provide readers with a broad overview of the School Board's finances, in a manner similar to private sector business.

The statement of net assets presents information on all of the School Board's assets and liabilities, with the difference between the two reported as net assets. Over time, increases or decreases in net assets may serve as a useful indicator of whether the financial position of the School Board is improving or deteriorating.

The statement of activities presents information showing how the government's net assets changed during the most recent fiscal year. All changes in net assets are reported as soon as the underlying event giving rise to the change occurs, regardless of the timing of the cash flows. Thus, revenues and expenses are reported in this statement for some items that will only result in cash flows in future periods (e.g., uncollected taxes and earned but unused sick leave).

Both of the government-wide financial statements present functions of the School Board that are principally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues (governmental activities). The School Board has no functions or activities which are business-like in nature, meaning that they are primarily supported by user fees and charges for services, such as a municipally owned utility system. The governmental activities of the School Board include regular and special education programs, support services, administration, maintenance, student transportation, and school food services. The School Board contains no other units of government (component units) nor is it contained as a component unit of any other level of local or state government.

Fund financial statements. A *fund* is a grouping of related accounts that are used to maintain control over the resources that have been segregated for specific activities or objectives. The School Board, like other state and local governments, uses fund accounting to ensure and demonstrate compliance with finance related legal requirements. All of the funds of the School Board can be divided into two categories: governmental funds and fiduciary funds.

Governmental funds. Governmental funds are used to account for essentially the same functions as governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. However, unlike the government-wide financial statements, governmental fund financial statements focus on *near term inflows and outflows of spendable resources*, as well as on *balances of spendable resources available* at the end of the fiscal year. Such information may be useful in evaluating a government-wide financial statements. Because of the focus of governmental funds is narrower than that of the government-wide financial statements, it is useful to compare the information presented for governmental funds with similar information presented for governmental activities in the government-wide financial statements. By doing so, readers may better understand the long term impact of the School Board's near-term financing decisions. Both the governmental fund balance sheet and the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures, and changes in fund balance provide a reconciliation to facilitate this comparison between governmental funds and governmental activities.

The School Board maintains dozens of individual governmental funds. Information is presented separately in the government fund balance sheet and in the governmental fund statement of revenues, expenditures and changes in fund balances for the General Fund, the Sales Tax Operations and Maintenance Fund and the Title I Fund, all of which are considered major funds. The remaining funds are combined into a single, aggregated presentation under the label of other governmental funds, which contains all non-major funds. Individual fund data for each of these non-major funds is provided in the form of combining statements elsewhere in this report.

Fund financial statements (Continued)

Fiduciary funds. Fiduciary funds are used to account for resources held for the benefit of outside parties such as students. Fiduciary funds are not reflected in the government-wide financial statements because of the resources of those funds are not available to support the School Board's programs. The School Board's fiduciary funds consist of the School Activity Fund, which contains monies belonging to the schools, their students, and clubs and other activities, and the Sales Tax Fund, which accounts for the collection and distribution of parish-wide sales taxes.

Notes to the financial statements. The notes provide additional information that is essential to a full understanding of the data provided in the government-wide and fund financial statements.

FINANCIAL ANALYSIS OF THE ENTITY (Continued)

- Cash and cash equivalents increased by approximately \$291,000 or 11.5% over the prior year due to decreased spending from budgetary adjustments and reduced receivables at year end. These assets, consisting of cash in local financial institutions comprise approximately 19.4% of total assets.
- Receivables have decreased by approximately \$127,000 or 7.2% over the prior year due to the timing of receipt
 of grant reimbursement requests near year end.
- Capital assets, which are reported net of accumulated depreciation, account for 69% of the total assets of the School Board for the most recent year ended.
- Total liabilities have increased by approximately \$460,000 or 15.7%, with salaries and related payables comprising 66.1% of amounts owed at year-end. The largest increase relates to the recognition of the School Board's net post employment benefit obligation.
- Unrestricted nets assets decreased by approximately \$236,000 or 18.3% over the prior year and accounted for 9.5% of total net assets at June 30, 2010.

Change in Net Assets

- MFP, which accounts for 54.7% of total revenues for 2010, decreased approximately \$651,000 due to reductions in funding made by the State of Louisiana and a reduction in the overall student body.
- Sales taxes, which account for 9.1% of total revenues for 2010, decreased by approximately \$562,000.
- Operating grant revenues, comprising 26.4% of total revenues for 2010, increased by approximately \$1.6 million which primarily related to funding received from the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009. Such funding was used during 2010 for Title I and IDEA programs.
- Expenses decreased by approximately \$207,000 or .9% over the previous year due primarily to personnel reductions made to align spending with available resources.

CAPITAL ASSET AND DEBT ADMINISTRATION

Capital Assets

At the end of 2010, the East Feliciana Parish School Board had approximately \$10 million invested in a broad range of capital assets, including land, building, and equipment. (See Table below).

This amount represents an increase (including additions and deductions) of approximately \$90,000 over last year due to the addition of assets during 2010, net of depreciation.

Long-term debt

At the end of the current fiscal year, the School Board had no bonded debt outstanding. Long-term liabilities consist of compensated absences payable of \$647,199, net other post employment benefit obligation of \$466,273, and a claims liability of \$25,000.

VARIATIONS BETWEEN ORIGINAL AND FINAL BUDGETS

Over the course of the year, the general fund operating budget was amended on several occasions. The amendment of the operating budget is a customary practice and is reflective of the change that occurs with financial related matters throughout the fiscal year. The most significant changes during 2010 were as follows:

Revenues:

The general fund budget was amended from the original projections to reflect decreases experienced in MFP and sales tax revenues and increases ad valorem taxes. The reductions forced the School Board to make necessary expenditure adjustments to maintain fund balance at an appropriate level.

Expenditures: ·

Budgeted expenditures were amended to reflect lower amounts incurred for personnel related costs due to reductions experienced in funding. Additionally, an amendment to increase building acquisitions/capital outlay was expected for projects expected to occur in 2010.

ANALYSIS OF FUND BALANCES

The General Fund's fund balance of \$916,670 represents unrestricted amounts available for future expenditure, and equals approximately 5% of the School Board's annual expenditures. Best practices recommend that governments maintain general fund balances equal to 10% of annual expenditures. The Operations and Maintenance Fund's fund balance of \$1,278,394 is also available for a broad range of uses, including operating costs paid by the general fund. On a combined basis, these two fund's fund balance equals approximately 12.4% of annual expenditures. The Title I Fund and the combined non-major funds' combined fund balance of \$21,427 is relatively low in comparison to the other funds due to the fact that these funds' primarily account for reimbursement based federal grant programs.

ECONOMIC FACTORS AND NEXT YEAR'S BUDGETS

The East Feliciana Parish School Board's elected and appointed officials considered the following factors and indicators when setting next year's budget, rates, and fees. These factors and indicators include:

- Sales tax revenues are budgeted to decrease compared to 2010 collections.
- Ad-valorem tax revenues are expected to remain the same as compared to the prior year.
- The General Fund operating budget was adopted to include a slight surplus.
- Health insurance and retirement benefit payments are expected to increase on an individual basis. However, the overall cost was reduced due to a lower number of personnel on staff for 2011.
- Minor capital outlay was budgeted for 2011.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

General Information

The East Feliciana Parish School Board (School Board) was created by Louisiana Revised Statute (LSA-R.S.) 17:51 for the purpose of providing public education for the residents of East Feliciana Parish. The School Board is authorized by LSA-R.S. 17:81 to establish policies and regulations for its own government consistent with the laws of the State of Louisiana and the regulations of the Louisiana Board of Elementary and Secondary Education. The School Board is authorized to establish public schools as it deems necessary, to provide adequate school facilities for the children of the parish, to determine the number of teachers to be employed, and to determine local supplements to their salaries. The School Board is currently comprised of 12 members who are elected from 7 districts for a term of four years.

During the fiscal year ended June 30, 2010, the School Board operated 8 schools within the parish with a total enrollment of approximately 2,600 pupils. Beginning with the 2010-2011 fiscal year the number of schools was reduced to 6 through a consolidation process. In conjunction with the regular educational programs, some of these schools offer special education and/or adult education programs. Additionally, the School Board provides transportation and school food services for the students.

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

a. <u>Reporting Entity</u>

The School Board complies with U.S. Generally Accepted Accounting Principles (GAAP). The School Board's reporting entity applies all relevant Governmental Accounting Standards Board (GASB) pronouncements. GASB Statement 14 establishes criteria for determining the governmental reporting entity and component units that should be included within the reporting entity. Under provisions of this Statement, the School Board is considered a primary government, since it is a special purpose government that has a separately elected governing body, is legally separate, and is fiscally independent of other state or local governments. As used in GASB Statement 14, fiscally independent means that the School Board may, without the approval or consent of another governmental entity, determine or modify its own budget, levy its own taxes or set rates or charges, and issue bonded debt. The School Board also has no component units, defined by GASB Statement 14 as other legally separate organizations for which the elected School Board members are financially accountable. There are no other primary governments with which the School Board has a significant relationship. Certain units of local government, over which the School Board exercises no oversight responsibility, such as the parish police jury, other independently elected parish officials, and municipalities within the parish, are excluded from the financial statements. These units of government are considered separate reporting entities and issue financial statements separate from that of the School Board. The School Board is not a component unit of any other entity.

b. Basis of Presentation

The School Board's *Basic Financial Statements* consist of the government-wide statements (on all of the nonfiduciary activities) and the fund financial statements (individual major fund, combined non-major funds, and the combined fiduciary funds.) The statements are prepared in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America as applied to governmental entities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

b. <u>Basis of Presentation</u> (continued)

Government-Wide Financial Statements

The government-wide financial statements include the Statement of Net Assets and the Statement of Activities for all non-fiduciary type activities. As a general rule, the effect of interfund activity has been removed from these statements. Exceptions to the general rule are advances between fiduciary funds and the various functions of the School Board. The government-wide presentation focuses primarily on the sustainability of the School Board as an entity over the long term and the change in aggregate economic position resulting from the activities of the fiscal period.

All programs of the School Board are considered to be *governmental activities* since all of the activities are normally supported by taxes and intergovernmental revenues, rather than fees for services.

The Statement of Activities demonstrates the degree to which the direct expenses of a given function are offset by program revenues. Program revenues included in the Statement of Activities are derived from parties outside the School Board's taxpayers or citizenry. As a whole, program revenues reduce the cost of the function to be financed from the taxpayers.

The School Board reports all direct expenses by function in the Statement of Activities. Direct expenses are those that are clearly identifiable with a function. Indirect expenses of other functions are not allocated to those functions but are reported separately in the Statement of Activities. Depreciation expense is considered an indirect expense and is reported separately on the Statement of Activities.

Fund Financial Statements

Emphasis of fund financial reporting is on the major funds. Non-major funds (by category) or fund type are summarized into a single column. The major funds of the School Board consist of the General fund and the Operations and Maintenance fund and the Title I fund.

The daily accounts and operations of the School Board are organized and maintained on the basis of funds and account groups, each of which is considered a separate accounting entity. The operations of each fund are accounted for with a separate set of self-balancing accounts that comprise its assets, liabilities, equity, revenues, and expenditures or expenses, as appropriate. Government resources are allocated to and accounted for in individual funds based upon the purpose for which they are to be expended and the means by which spending activities are controlled.

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to a fund is determined by its measurement focus. All Governmental Funds are accounted for using a current financial resources measurement focus. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities generally are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present increases (i.e., revenues and other financial sources) and decreases (i.e., expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

b. Basis of Presentation (continued)

The funds of the School Board are classified into two broad categories: Governmental and Fiduciary.

Governmental Fund Types:

Governmental funds are those through which most governmental functions of the School Board are financed. The acquisition, use and balances of the School Board's expendable financial resources and the related liabilities are accounted for through governmental funds. The measurement focus is on the determination of changes in short-term financial position, rather than upon net income. The following are the School Board's governmental fund types:

<u>General Fund</u> - The General Fund is the general operating fund of the School Board. It accounts for all financial resources except those required to be accounted for in other funds.

<u>Special Revenue Funds</u> - Special Revenue Funds account for the proceeds of specific revenue sources that are legally restricted to expenditures for specified purposes. These funds account for the revenues and expenditures related to federal and state grant programs established for various educational objectives as well as a fund to account for the proceeds of a 1% sales tax dedicated to operations.

<u>Debt Service Fund</u> - The Debt Service Fund, established to meet requirements of bond ordinances, is used to account for the accumulation of resources for and the payment of general long-term debt principal, interest, and related costs.

<u>Capital Projects Fund</u> – The Capital Projects Fund was established to account for capital improvements, including construction of new facilities and renovations.

Fiduciary Fund Type - Agency Funds:

Fiduciary funds are used to account for assets held by the School Board in a trustee or agency capacity. The agency funds are custodial in nature (assets equal liabilities) and do not involve measurement of results or operations.

c. Basis of Accounting/Measurement Focus

Government-Wide Financial Statements (GWFS)

The GWFS were prepared using the economic resources measurement focus and the accrual basis of accounting. Revenues are recorded when earned and expenses are recorded when a liability has been incurred, regardless of the timing of related cash flows. Property taxes are recognized as revenues in the year

for which they are levied. Sales taxes are recognized when the underlying sales transactions occur. Grants and similar items are recognized as revenue as soon as all eligibility requirements imposed by the provider have been met.

Fund Financial Statements (FFS)

The accounting and financial reporting treatment applied to a fund is determined by its measurement focus. The Agency Fund type is accounted for on a flow of economic resources measurement focus (accrual basis). With this measurement focus, all assets and all liabilities associated with the operation of these funds are included on the balance sheet.

Governmental Funds are accounted for using a current financial resources measurement focus and the modified accrual basis of accounting. With this measurement focus, only current assets and current liabilities generally are included on the balance sheet. Operating statements of these funds present increases (i.e., revenues and other financial sources) and decreases (i.e., expenditures and other financing uses) in net current assets.

The following paragraphs describe the revenue recognition practices under the modified accrual basis of accounting:

<u>Revenues</u>

Governmental fund revenues resulting from exchange transactions are recognized in the fiscal year in which the exchange takes place and meets the government's availability criteria (susceptible to accrual). Available means that the resources will be collected within the current fiscal year or are expected to be collected soon enough thereafter to be used to pay liabilities of the current fiscal year. Charges for services, fines and forfeits, and most governmental miscellaneous revenues, including investment earnings, are recorded as earned since they are measurable and available. The Board definition of available generally means expected to be received within sixty days of the end of the fiscal year.

Non-exchange transactions, in which the Board receives value without directly giving value in return, include sales tax, property tax, special assessments, grants, entitlements, and donations. Property taxes are considered measurable in the calendar year of the tax levy if collected soon enough to meet the availability criteria. Sales taxes and gross receipts business taxes are considered "measurable" when the underlying transaction occurs and meets the availability criteria. Anticipated refunds of such taxes are recorded as fund liabilities and reductions of revenue when they are measurable and valid. Special assessments are recognized as revenues only to the extent that individual installments are considered current assets in the governmental fund types. Revenue from grants, entitlements and donations is recognized in the fiscal year

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

in which all eligibility requirements have been satisfied. Eligibility requirements include timing requirements, which specify the year when the resources can be used.

Expenditures

Salaries are recorded as expenditures when incurred. Nine-month employee salaries are incurred over a nine month period but can be paid over a period up to twelve months.

Compensated absences are recognized as expenditures when leave is actually taken or when employees (or heirs) are paid for accrued leave upon retirement or death, while the cost of leave privileges not requiring current resources is recorded as a general long-term debt.

Commitments under construction contracts are recognized as expenditures when earned by the contractor.

Principal and interest on general long-term debt are not recognized until due.

All other expenditures are generally recognized under the modified accrual basis of accounting when the related fund liability is incurred if it is expected to be paid within the next twelve months. Liabilities which will not be liquidated with expendable available financial resources are not recorded in the funds.

d. Budget Practices

The proposed budgets for fiscal year 2010 were completed and made available for public inspection at the School Board office. A public hearing was held for suggestions and comments from taxpayers. The proposed fiscal year 2010 budgets were formally adopted by the School Board after the public hearing. The budgets, which included proposed expenditures and the means of financing them, for the General and Special Revenue Funds, were made available to the public.

The budgets for the General and Special Revenue Funds were prepared on the modified accrual basis of accounting. Formal budgetary integration is used during the year as a management control device. Any part of appropriations which is not expensed is not automatically reappropriated in the next year.

The School Board is authorized to transfer amounts between line items within any fund. When actual revenues within a fund are failing to meet estimated annual budgeted revenues by five percent or more, and/or actual expenditures within a fund are exceeding estimated budgeted expenditures by five percent or more, a budget amendment to reflect such changes is adopted by the School Board in a public meeting. Budgeted amounts included in the financial statements include the original adopted budget and all subsequent amendments.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

e. Cash, Cash Equivalents, and Investments

Under state law, the School Board may deposit funds with a fiscal agent organized under the laws of the State of Louisiana, the laws of any other state in the union, or the laws of the United States. The School Board may invest in United States bonds, notes, bills, or certificates and time deposits of state banks organized under Louisiana law and national banks having principal offices in Louisiana.

Cash and cash equivalents include cash on hand and cash on deposit with the fiscal agent bank. These deposits are stated at cost, which approximates fair value. Under state law, the resulting bank balances of these deposits must be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent bank. The estimated fair value of the pledged securities plus the federal deposit insurance must at all times equal or exceed the amount on deposit with the fiscal agent.

f. Inventory

Inventory of the School Lunch Special Revenue Fund consists of food purchased by the School Board and commodities provided by the United States Department of Agriculture. The commodities are recorded as revenues and expenditures when consumed. All inventory items purchased are valued at the lower of cost or market (first-in, first-out), and donated commodities are assigned values based on information provided by the United States Department of Agriculture.

g. Capital Assets

All capital assets are capitalized at historical cost, or estimated historical cost for assets where actual historical cost is not available. Donated assets are recorded as capital assets at their estimated fair market value at the date of donation. The School Board maintains threshold levels for capitalizing capital assets of \$5,000.

Capital assets are recorded in the GWFS, but are not reported in the FFS. All capital assets are depreciated using the straight-line method over their estimated useful lives. Since surplus assets are sold for an immaterial amount when declared as no longer needed for public school purposes by the School Board, no salvage value is taken into consideration for depreciation purposes. Useful lives vary from 5 to 15 years for equipment, 10 to 20 years for building and land improvements, and 40 years for buildings.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

h. Annual, Sick and Sabbatical Leave

All twelve-month employees earn annual leave based on the date of employment in accordance with the following schedule:

Annual leave may be accumulated and carried forward as earned up to a maximum of 30 days. Upon retirement or separation of employment, all unused accumulated vacation leave is paid to all eligible employees or to their estates.

All School Board employees earn 8 to 18 days of sick leave each year, which can be accumulated without limitation depending upon length of service with the School Board. Upon retirement or death, unused sick leave of up to 25 days is paid to the employee (or heirs) at the employee's current rate of pay, and all unused sick leave, including the 25 days paid, is used in the retirement benefit computation as earned service.

Sabbatical leave may be granted for rest and recuperation or for professional and cultural improvement.

Sabbatical leave benefits are recorded as an expenditure of the period in which paid. The cost of leave privileges, computed in accordance with Codification Section C60, is recognized as a current year expenditure in the governmental funds when leave is actually taken or when employees (or heirs) are paid for accrued leave upon retirement or death.

i. Sales Taxes

The East Feliciana Parish School Board levies a combined two percent sales and use tax within East Feliciana Parish consisting of:

• A one percent sales and use tax renewed on October 21, 1995 for the ten years beginning June 30, 1998. One-half of the proceeds of this one percent sales tax are dedicated to the payment of teachers' salaries. The remainder of the proceeds is to be used for the operations, including maintenance and improvement, of school buildings and sites of the public schools in East Feliciana Parish. This tax was renewed on July 1, 2008 for a period of ten years.

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NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (continued)

i. Sales Taxes (continued)

• An additional one percent sales tax was approved by voters of the Parish on October 17, 1981 and expiring on December 31, 2007. This sales tax was dedicated to capital improvements of the public school system of East Feliciana Parish, payment of any indebtedness incurred in making capital improvements, and payment of maintenance and operational expenses of the School Board. This tax was renewed effective January 1, 2008 for a period of ten years. Ninety-one percent of this tax was dedicated by the School Board for the payment of salary supplements during the year ended June 30, 2010.

The sales tax department of the School Board also collects sales and use taxes levied by the East Feliciana Parish Police Jury. The Police Jury pays the School Board a collection fee that is negotiated annually. The collection and distribution of the sales taxes are accounted for in the Sales Tax Agency Fund.

j. Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities to the date of the financial statements and the reported amounts of revenues and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

2. Property Taxes

All taxable property in Louisiana is required by law to be assessed annually at a percentage of its fair market value by the parish assessor, except for public utility property which is assessed by the Louisiana Tax Commission. The 1974 Louisiana Constitution provided that, beginning in 1978, all land and residential property be assessed at 10% of fair market value; agricultural, horticultural, marsh lands, timber lands, and certain historic buildings be assessed at 10% of "use" value; and all other property be assessed at 15% of fair market value. Fair market values are determined by the elected assessor of the parish and are subject to review and final certification by the Louisiana Tax Commission. The assessor is required to reappraise all property every four years. The Sheriff of East Feliciana Parish, as provided by state law, is the official tax collector of property taxes levied by the parish and parish special districts.

Property taxes are recognized as revenue in the fiscal year for which they are levied. State law requires the sheriff to collect property taxes in the calendar year in which the assessment is made. Tax bills are mailed in November/December. If taxes are not paid by the due date of December 31, they bear interest at one percent per month until paid. After notice is given to the delinquent taxpayers, the sheriff is required by the Constitution of the State of Louisiana to sell the least quantity of property necessary to settle the taxes and interest owed.

3. <u>Cash</u>

The School Board's cash and cash equivalents consist entirely of deposits in local financial institutions. At year end, the carrying amount of the School Board's deposits was \$3,793,142 and the bank balance was \$4,620,538.

Deposits in financial institutions can be exposed to custodial credit risk. Custodial credit risk for deposits is the risk that in event of financial institution failure, the School Board's deposits may not be returned to them. To mitigate this risk, state law requires deposits to be secured by federal deposit insurance or the pledge of securities owned by the fiscal agent financial institution. The School Board's deposits were not subject to custodial credit risk at June 30, 2010.

In accordance with LSA-R.S. 39:562, the School Board is legally restricted from incurring long-term bonded debt in excess of 35 percent of the net assessed value of taxable property. At June 30, 2010, the net assessed value of taxable property for the parish was \$102,289,605, which would result in a \$35,801,362 long-term bonded debt limit.

The compensated absence liability will be liquidated primarily from the general fund.

7. Operating Lease

The School Board leases school buses through a lease arrangement which qualifies as an operating lease. Lease payments in the amount of \$105,500 are scheduled annually over a 5 year period ending September 30, 2010.

In addition, the School Board contracts with individual bus owners on an annual basis for a period of one school year. The School Board had 15 operating lease agreements for the use of privately owned busses with various individual bus owners for the year ended June 30, 2010. Lease payments total \$1,000 per month for each operating lease agreement. Total payments under the agreements were \$135,000 for the school year ended June 30, 2010.

8. Retirement Systems

Substantially all employees of the School Board are members of two statewide retirement systems. In general, professional employees (such as teachers and principals) and lunchroom workers are members of the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana; other employees, such as custodial personnel and bus drivers, are members of the Louisiana School Employees' Retirement System. These systems are cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plans administered by separate boards of trustees. Pertinent information relative to each plan follows:

a. Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRS)

Plan Description. The TRS consists of three membership plans: Regular Plan, Plan A, and Plan B. The TRS provides retirement benefits as well as disability and survivor benefits. Ten years of service credit is required to become vested for retirement benefits and five years to become vested for disability and survivor benefits. Benefits are established and amended by state statute. The TRS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the TRS. That report may be obtained by writing to the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana, Post Office Box 94123, Baton Rouge, Louisiana 70804-9123, or by calling (225) 925-6446.

Funding Policy. Plan members are required to contribute 8.0 percent, 9.1 percent, and 5.0 percent of their annual covered salary for the Regular Plan, Plan A, and Plan B, respectively. The School Board is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The current rate is 15.5% of annual covered payroll for all three membership plans. Member contributions and employer contributions for the TRS are established by state law and rates are established by the Public Retirement Systems' Actuarial Committee.

The School Board's contributions to the TRS for the years ended June 30, 2010, 2009, and 2008, were \$1,765,895, \$1,684,696, \$1,982,091, respectively, equal to the required contributions for each year.

b. Louisiana School Employees' Retirement System (LSERS)

Plan Description. The LSERS provides retirement benefits as well as disability and survivor benefits. Ten years of service credit is required to become vested for retirement benefits and five years to become vested for disability and survivor benefits. Benefits are established and amended by state statute. The LSERS issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the LSERS. That report may be obtained by writing to the Louisiana School Employees' Retirement System, Post Office Box 44516, Baton Rouge, Louisiana 70804, or by calling (225) 925-6484.

Funding Policy. Plan members are required to contribute 7.5 percent of their annual covered salary and the School Board is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. The actuarially determined obligation for the School Board was 17.6% for the year ended June 30, 2010. Member contributions and employer contributions for the LSERS are established by state law and rates are established by the Public Retirement Systems' Actuarial Committee.

The School Board's contributions to the LSERS for the years ended June 30, 2010, 2009, and 2008 were \$202,421, \$224,268, \$224,050, respectively.

9. Post-employment Health Care Benefits

Effective with the Fiscal Year beginning July 1, 2008, East Feliciana Parish School Board implemented Government Accounting Standards Board Statement Number 45, Accounting and Financial Reporting by Employers for Post employment Benefits Other than Pensions (GASB 45).

Plan Description. The East Feliciana Parish School Board's medical benefits are provided through the Louisiana Office of Group Benefits and are made available to employees upon actual retirement.

The Louisiana Office of Group Benefits (OGB) involves several statewide networks and one HMO with a premium structure by region. The plan provisions are contained in the official plan documents of the OGB, available at *www.groupbenefits.org - "Quick Links" - "Health Plans"*. The OGB plan is a fully insured, multiple-employer arrangement and has been deemed to be an *agent multiple-employer plan* (within the meaning of paragraph 22 of GASB 45) for financial reporting purposes and for this valuation. The OGB "Medicare Advantage" plan has been assumed as an alternative to those employees after Medicare eligibility for purposes of this valuation, and we have assumed that 50% of post-Medicare eligibility retirees elect that plan. Medical benefits are provided to employees upon actual retirement. Most employees are covered by the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL), whose retirement eligibility (D.R.O.P. entry) provisions as follows: 30 years of service at any age; age 55 and 25 years of service; or, age 65 and 20 years of service. The remainder of employees are covered by the Louisiana School Employees' Retirement System (LSER) whose retirement (D.R.O.P. entry) eligibility provisions are the same as TRSL except that they are also eligible to retire at age 60 and 10 years of service.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

9. Post-employment Health Care Benefits (continued)

Life insurance coverage under the OGB program is available to retirees by election and the blended rate (active and retired) is \$0.96 per \$1,000 of insurance. The employer pays 50% of the "cost" of the retiree life insurance, but based on the blended rates. Since GASB 45 requires the use of "unblended" rates, we have used the 94GAR mortality table described above to "unblend" the rates so as to reproduce the composite blended rate overall as the rate structure to calculate the actuarial valuation results for life insurance. All of the assumptions used for the valuation of the medical benefits have been used except for the trend assumption; zero trend was used for life insurance. Insurance coverage amounts are reduced at age 65 and again at age 70 according to the OGB plan provisions.

Contribution Rates. Employees do not contribute to their post employment benefits costs until they become retirees and begin receiving those benefits. The plan provisions and contribution rates are contained in the official plan documents.

Funding Policy. Until 2008, the East Feliciana Parish School Board recognized the cost of providing postemployment medical and life benefits (East Feliciana Parish School Board's portion of the retiree medical and life benefit premiums) as an expense when the benefit premiums were due and financed the cost of the postemployment benefits on a pay-as-you-go basis. With the adoption of GASB 45, the East Feliciana Parish School Board still pays the benefits on a pay as you go basis; however, the cost of benefits earned is determined actuarially and expensed as earned, regardless of when the benefit is paid. The health care plan funding cost paid (contributed) for retired employees totaled \$803,795 and the life insurance totaled \$33,491.

Annual Required Contribution. East Feliciana Parish School Board's Annual Required Contribution (ARC) is an amount actuarially determined in accordance with GASB 45. The Annual Required Contribution (ARC) is the sum of the Normal Cost plus the contribution needed to amortize the Actuarial Accrued Liability (AAL). A level dollar, closed amortization period of 30 years (the maximum amortization period allowed by GASB 43/45) has been used for the post-employment benefits. The total ARC for the fiscal year beginning July 1, 2009 is \$1,021,665 for medical, and \$55,347 for life, as set forth below:

Funded Status and Funding Progress. In the fiscal year ending June 30, 2010, East Feliciana Parish School Board made no contributions to its post employment benefits plan other than payment of retiree premiums. The plan was not funded at all, has no assets set aside in an irrevocable trust, and hence has a funded ratio of zero. As of July 1, 2008, the first and most recent actuarial valuation, the Actuarial Accrued Liability (AAL) was \$12,765,003 (medical) and \$848,570 (life), which is defined as that portion, as determined by a particular actuarial cost method (East Feliciana Parish School Board uses the Unit Credit Cost Method), of the actuarial present value of post employment plan benefits and expenses which is not provided by normal cost. Since the plan was not funded in fiscal year 2009/2010, the entire actuarial accrued liability of \$12,765,003 (medical) and \$848,570 (life) was unfunded.

Actuarial Methods and Assumptions. Actuarial valuations involve estimates of the value of reported amounts and assumptions about the probability of events far into the future. The actuarial valuation for post employment benefits includes estimates and assumptions regarding (1) turnover rate; (2) retirement rate; (3) health care cost trend rate; (4) mortality rate; (5) discount rate (investment return assumption); and (6) the period to which the costs apply (past, current, or future years of service by employees). Actuarially determined amounts are subject to continual revision as actual results are compared to past expectations and new estimates are made about the future.

The actuarial calculations are based on the types of benefits provided under the terms of the substantive plan (the plan as understood by East Feliciana Parish School Board and its employee plan members) at the time of the valuation and on the pattern of sharing costs between East Feliciana Parish School Board and its plan members to that point. The projection of benefits for financial reporting purposes does not explicitly incorporate the potential effects of legal or contractual funding limitations on the pattern of cost sharing between East Feliciana Parish School Board and plan members in the future. Consistent with the long-term perspective of actuarial calculations, the actuarial methods and assumptions used include techniques that are designed to reduce short-term volatility in actuarial liabilities and the actuarial value of assets.

Actuarial Cost Method. The ARC is determined using the Unit Credit Cost Method. The employer portion of the cost for retiree medical care in each future year is determined by projecting the current cost levels using the healthcare cost trend rate and discounting this projected amount to the valuation date using the other described pertinent actuarial assumptions, including the investment return assumption (discount rate), mortality, and turnover.

Actuarial Value of Plan Assets. Since this is the first actuarial valuation, there are not any assets. It is anticipated that in future valuations a smoothed market value consistent with Actuarial Standards Board ASOP 6, as provided in paragraph number 125 of GASB Statement 45.

Turnover Rate. An age-related turnover scale based on actual experience as described by administrative staff has been used. The rates, when applied to the active employee census, produce an annual turnover of approximately 10%. The rates for each age are below:

Post employment Benefit Plan Eligibility Requirements. It is assumed that entitlement to benefits will commence six years after earliest eligibility to enter the D.R.O.P. as described on the first page of this letter under the heading "Plan Description". This consists of a three year D.R.O.P. period plus an additional three year delay. Medical benefits are provided to employees upon actual retirement. Most employees are covered by the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL), whose retirement eligibility (D.R.O.P. entry) provisions as follows: 30 years of service at any age; age 55 and 25 years of service; or, age 65 and 20 years of service. The remainder of employees is covered by the Louisiana School Employees' Retirement System (LSER) whose retirement (D.R.O.P. entry) eligibility provisions are the same as TRSL except that they are also eligible to retire at age 60 and 10 years of service. Entitlement to benefits continues through Medicare to death.

Investment Return Assumption (Discount Rate). GASB Statement 45 states that the investment return assumption should be the estimated long-term investment yield on the investments that are expected to be used to finance the payment of benefits (that is, for a plan which is funded). Based on the assumption that the ARC will not be funded, a 4% annual investment return has been used in this valuation. This is a conservative estimate of the expected long term return of a balanced and conservative investment portfolio under professional management.

Health Care Cost Trend Rate. The expected rate of increase in medical cost is based on projections performed by the Office of the Actuary at the Centers for Medicare & Medicaid Services as published in National Health Care Expenditures Projections: 2003 to 2013, Table 3: National Health Expenditures, Aggregate and per Capita Amounts, Percent Distribution and Average Annual Percent Change by Source of Funds: Selected Calendar Years 1990-2013, released in January, 2004 by the Health Care Financing Administration (www.cms.hhs.gov). "State and Local" rates for 2009 through 2013 from this report were used, with rates beyond 2013 graduated down to an ultimate annual rate of 5.0% for 2016 and later.

Zero trend has been assumed for valuing life insurance.

Mortality Rate. The 1994 Group Annuity Reserving (94GAR) table, projected to 2002, based on a fixed blend of 50% of the unloaded male mortality rate and 50% of the unloaded female mortality rates, was used. This is the mortality table which the Internal Revenue Service requires to be used in determining the value of accrued benefits in defined benefit pension plans. Since GASB 45 requires the use of "unblended" rates, we have used the 94GAR mortality table described above to "unblend" the rates so as to reproduce the composite blended rate overall as the rate structure to calculate the actuarial valuation results for life insurance.

Method of Determining Value of Benefits. The "value of benefits" has been assumed to be the portion of the premium after retirement date expected to be paid by the employer for each retiree and has been used as the basis for calculating the actuarial present value of OPEB benefits to be paid. The "State Share" premiums in the OGB medical rate schedule provided are "unblended" rates for active and retired as required by GASB 45 and have been used for valuation purposes.

Transfers between funds generally consist of two types: 1) Transfers to the general fund from the federal grant funds for indirect cost reimbursements; 2) Transfers from the operations and maintenance fund to the general fund for salary supplements.

11. Litigation, Claims and Contingencies

The School Board is a defendant in various lawsuits. Although the outcome of these lawsuits is not presently determinable, in the opinion of the Board's attorneys, the resolution of these matters will not have a material adverse effect on the financial condition of the School Board. However, a liability of \$25,000 equal to the insurance policy deductible is recorded as a long-term liability in the statement of net assets to cover any contingent losses.

The School Board participates in a number of federally assisted grant programs. These programs are audited in accordance with the OMB Circular A-133, "Audits of State and Local Governments and Non-Profit Organizations". Additionally, these programs are subject to state and federal monitoring examinations which could result in disallowed costs having to be returned to the granting agency. Management believes that further examinations would not result in material disallowed costs.

13. Current Operating Environment

The School Board's general fund has operated at either a deficit at a break-even level for four consecutive fiscal years. This has resulted in a depletion of the accumulated general fund balance. The School Board is continually monitoring its financial position and formatting strategies to allow the system to operate within available financial resources. Initiatives toward this end include school consolidation, staff mandated reductions and other actions. As the School Board navigates through the current and upcoming fiscal periods of mandated increased costs and revenue declines caused by the economic downturn, such initiatives will continue to be explored.

Budgetary comparison schedules are reported for the following general and special revenue funds:

General Fund

The General Fund accounts for all financial transactions except those required to be accounted for in another fund.

Operations and Maintenance Fund

The Operations and Maintenance Fund (formerly the Sales Tax Debt Service Fund) accounts for the proceeds of the one cent sales tax approved by the voters on October 17, 1981 and expiring on December 31, 2007. The original debt associated with this tax has been retired; however, the voter referendum allows for a broader use of the proceeds, beyond payment of debt. In recent years, the School Board has used the proceeds to fund salary supplements and capital improvements. In October 2005, the voters of East Feliciana Parish approved the continuation of this 1% sales tax for a period of ten years, commencing on January 1, 2008. The tax has been internally rededicated and used as follows:

- 91% is to be used for the purpose of paying salaries and benefits for all employees of the School System
- 9%, for maintaining and operating public schools in East Feliciana Parish.

Title I

The Title I fund accounts for the federally funded Title I program which is aimed at improving low achieving schools or students with emphasis on at-risk students. The program is overseen by the Louisiana Department of Education.

NON-MAJOR GOVERNMENTAL FUND DESCRIPTIONS

JUNE 30, 2010

<u>Title II</u>

The Title II fund accounts for a federally funded program aimed at enhancing and improving teacher quality. This program is overseen by the Louisiana Department of Education.

Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) Funds

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for those expenditures related to providing children with disabilities special education and related services designed to meet their unique needs.

Temporary Assistance to Needy Families (TANF) Funds

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for those expenditures related to providing assistance to needy families with children to reduce and prevent out of wedlock pregnancies.

Vocational Education

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for those expenditures related to the support of vocational education programs at the secondary level.

Safe Drug-Free Schools and Communities Greatest Needs (Drug Free)

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for those expenditures related to offering a disciplined environment conducive to learning by preventing violence in and around schools.

21st Century Community Learning Centers (21st Century)

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for those expenditures related to the operation of a community learning center during after-school hours to expand the academic enrichment opportunities for the children attending these centers.

Other Federal Funds

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for the federal awards not included in the Federal Funds described above.

State Grants

This Special Revenue Fund accounts for the various State awards including 8(G), Lincs, Millinium Trust Fund and other awards.

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NON-MAJOR GOVERNMENTAL FUND DESCRIPTIONS

<u>JUNE 30, 2010</u>

School Food Service Fund

The School Food Service Fund is used to account for the operations of the school food service program. The purposes of the school food service program are to serve nutritionally adequate, attractive and moderately priced meals, to help children grow socially and emotionally, to extend educational influences to the homes of school children, and to provide learning experiences that will improve children's food habits with the ultimate goal of physically fit adults. The program is subsidized by grants from the U.S. Department of Agriculture and the Louisiana Department of Education.

Consolidated School District No. 1 Debt Service Funds

The Consolidated School District No. 1 Debt Service Fund was initially established to account for ad valorem taxes collected for debt service of a \$5,445,000 bond issue. Although the bonds for which these monies were accumulated to pay have been retired, the residual funds continue to be accounted for in the debt service fund.

Capital Projects Funds

These funds account for various major capital improvements.

AGENCY FUNDS

Sales Tax Fund

Collection, custodianship and disbursement of sales taxes for the entire parish are accounted for in this fund. The sales taxes consist of a two percent sales and use tax levied by the School Board and a two percent sales and use tax levied by the East Feliciana Parish Police Jury. Since these taxes are remitted to the beneficiary government (including the School Board's General Fund and Operations and Maintenance Fund), this fund is considered to be a collection agent.

School Activity Funds

The activities of the various school accounts are accounted for in the School Activity Funds. While the funds are under the supervision of the School Board, these funds belong to the individual schools or their student bodies and are not available for use in operations.

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REPORT ON INTERNAL CONTROL OVER FINANCIAL REPORTING AND ON COMPLIANCE AND OTHER MATTERS BASED ON AN AUDIT OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS PERFORMED IN ACCORDANCE WITH GOVERNMENT AUDITING STANDARDS

We have audited the basic financial statements of the East Feliciana Parish School Board as of and for the year ended June 30, 2010, and have issued our report thereon dated March 12, 2011. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States.

Internal Control over Financial Reporting

In planning and performing our audit, we considered the East Feliciana Parish School Board's internal control over financial reporting as a basis for designing our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on the financial statements and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of the East Feliciana Parish School Board's internal control over financial reporting. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the East Feliciana Parish School Board's internal control over financial reporting.

A *deficiency in internal control* exists when the design or operation of a control does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct misstatements on a timely basis. A *material weakness* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control such that there is a reasonable possibility that a material misstatement of the entity's financial statements will not be prevented, or detected, and corrected on a timely basis.

Our consideration of the internal control over financial reporting was for the limited purpose described in the first paragraph of this section and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that might be deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over financial reporting that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

Compliance and Other Matters

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As part of obtaining reasonable assurance about whether the East Feliciana Parish School Board's financial statements are free of material misstatement, we performed tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts, and grant agreements, noncompliance with which could have a direct and material effect on the determination of financial statement amounts. However, providing an opinion on compliance with those provisions was not an objective of our audit, and accordingly, we do not express such an opinion. The results of our tests disclosed one instance of noncompliance that is required to be reported under *Government Auditing Standards* which is reported as item 2010-1 in the schedule of findings and questioned costs.

The East Feliciana Parish School Board's responses to the findings identified in our audit are described in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. We did not audit the East Feliciana Parish School Board's responses and, accordingly, we express no opinion on the responses.

We noted certain matters that we reported to management of the East Feliciana Parish School Board, in a separate letter dated March 12, 2011.

Compliance

We have audited the compliance of the East Feliciana Parish School Board (the School Board) with the types of compliance requirements described in the U.S. Office of Management and Budget (OMB) Circular A-133 Compliance Supplement that could have a direct and material effect on each of its major federal programs for the year ended June 30, 2010. The East Feliciana Parish School Board's major federal programs are identified in the summary of auditors' results section of the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs. Compliance with the requirements of laws, regulations, contracts, and grants applicable to each of its major federal programs is the responsibility of the East Feliciana Parish School Board's compliance based on our responsibility is to express an opinion on the East Feliciana Parish School Board's compliance based on our audit.

We conducted our audit of compliance in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America; the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards* issued by the Comptroller General of the United States; and OMB Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations.* Those standards and OMB Circular A-133 require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether noncompliance with the types of compliance requirements referred to above that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program occurred. As described in item 2010-2 in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs, the School Board did not comply with requirements regarding maintenance of effort that are applicable to its IDEA (Special Education) program cluster. Compliance with such requirements is necessary, in our opinion, for the Board to comply with the requirements applicable to that program.

In our opinion, except for the noncompliance described in the preceding paragraph, the East Feliciana Parish School Board complied, in all material respects, with the compliance requirements referred to above that are applicable to each of its major federal programs identified in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs for the year ended June 30, 2010.

Internal Control Over Compliance

Management of the School Board is responsible for establishing and maintaining effective internal control over compliance with the compliance requirements referred to above. In planning and performing our audit, we considered the School Board's internal control over compliance with the requirements that could have a direct and material effect on a major federal program in order to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing our opinion on compliance and to test and report on internal control over compliance in accordance

with OMB Circular A-133, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of internal control over compliance. Accordingly, we do not express an opinion on the effectiveness of the Board's internal control over compliance.

Our consideration of internal control over compliance was for the limited purpose described in the preceding paragraph and was not designed to identify all deficiencies in internal control that might be significant deficiencies or material weaknesses in internal control over compliance and therefore, there can be no assurance that all deficiencies, significant deficiencies, or material weaknesses have been identified. However, as discussed below, we identified certain deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses and other deficiencies that we consider to be significant deficiencies.

A deficiency in internal control over compliance exists when the design or operation of a control over compliance does not allow management or employees, in the normal course of performing their assigned functions, to prevent, or detect and correct, noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program on a timely basis. A material weakness in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance, such that there is a reasonable possibility that material noncompliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program will not be prevented, or detected and corrected, on a timely basis. We did not identify any deficiencies in internal control over compliance that we consider to be material weaknesses, as defined above.

A significant deficiency in internal control over compliance is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control over compliance with a type of compliance requirement of a federal program that is less severe than a material weakness in internal control over compliance, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance. We consider the matter described in item 2010-2 in the accompanying schedule of findings and questioned costs to be a significant deficiency.

<u>Criteria:</u>	LA R.S. 24:513 requires all political subdivisions to submit audited financial statements and other appropriate compliance audit reports to the Louisiana Legislative Auditor within six months of the end of its fiscal year.
Condition:	The financial statements and compliance audits were submitted after the six-month time frame.
Effect:	The School Board is out of compliance with the statute.
<u>Cause</u> :	Complex compliance issues with regard to federal grant funds required additional time for resolution.
Questioned (Costs: None
Recommend	ation: The School Board's staff and its auditors should address such compliance issues earlier in the audit process to ensure timely submission of the audit.

View of Responsible Official and Planned Corrective Action:

School Board Management agrees with the finding. We would like to point out that submitting our audits untimely is an uncommon practice. This year's audit encountered unusual circumstances. However, steps will be taken to ensure timely submission of future audits in accordance with the aforementioned statute.

<u>Criteria</u> :	Local Education Authorities (LEA's) must expend, either in total or on a per-pupil basis, state and local funds toward Special Education in amounts equal to or greater than that of the previous period.
Condition(s):	The School Board did not expend local funds, either in total or per pupil, an amount equal to or greater than that of the previous period for Special Education.
<u>Cause</u> :	The School Board has been and is currently facing financial difficulties. In order to operate on a fiscally responsible basis, the Board reduced costs to its general fund during 2010. The general fund accounts for most of its state and locally funded operations. Special Education was an area of targeted reductions and those reductions were to occur through reductions of personnel/employees.

<u>2010 - 2</u> <u>Matching\Level of Effort (continued)</u>

As further explanation of the cause, the targeted Special Education reductions were not actually experienced. The Board, in an attempt to comply with the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act, used Special Education ARRA grant funds (CFDA # 84.391) to cover the compensation costs of those Special Education employees whose jobs would have been eliminated. However, an unintended and unknown consequence of this decision was that the required level of local effort was not maintained.

Effect: The School Board did not maintain its required level of state and local effort for Special Education.

<u>Questioned Costs</u>: \$185,000; the approximate amount by which the School Board was deficient in state and local spending toward Special Education in 2010.

Recommendation: The School Board should take steps to maintain the required local effort.

View of Responsible Official and Planned Corrective Action:

School Board administrative staff were faced with financial challenges during the 2009-2010 fiscal year. In an effort to address the challenges, while at the same time saving jobs in the spirit of the American Recovery and Reinvestments Act, the Board decided to avoid layoffs of certain general fund personnel by funding those positions with ARRA funding. Research was conducted and discussions were held with the SEA. In good faith, the Board's staff believed that jobs of the Special Education employees could be "saved" using the Special Education ARRA funding, and that these funds were allowed a similar flexibility as that allowed for the State Fiscal Stabilization Program (CFDA #84.394). We now understand the unintended consequences of our decision and will work to remedy this condition going forward into 2010-2011 and 2011-2012 by increasing the level of fiscal effort.

2009 - 1 Budget Law Violation

<u>Criteria</u> :	LA Revised Statute 39:1310 requires governments to amend general and special revenue fund budgets when actual expenditures plus expected expenditures exceed budgeted amounts by 5% or more or when actual revenues plus expected revenues will fall short of budgeted amounts by 5% or more.
Condition:	The School Board's Operation and Maintenance Fund actual revenues did not meet budgeted projections by 16%.
Effect:	The School Board is in violation of LA Revised Statute 39:1310.
Recommendation:	We recommend that all funds adhere to the adopted budget and monitor compliance. When it becomes apparent that expenditures exceed the budget by 5% or more, or when revenues fall short by 5% or more, the budget should be brought before the Board for amendment.
Current Status:	Resolved. Management performs a monthly review of the budget versus actual amounts and prepares amended budgets when necessary.

<u>2009 - 2</u> <u>Procurement</u>

<u>Criteria</u> :	Under the compliance criteria set forth for procurement of equipment with federal funds, the same State policies and procedures used for procurements from non-federal funds shall be used. LA Revised Statute 38:2212.1 requires the advertisement and letting of lowest responsible bidder for the purchase of materials and supplies in excess of \$20,000 paid out of public funds.
Condition(s):	The School Board purchased produce from one vendor without submitting this purchase to the bid process when there are other produce vendors within the area.
Effect:	The School Board is out of compliance with the statute referenced to above. As a result, the School Board may not be receiving the lowest price for its goods and services.
Questioned Costs:	The difference between bid price (no bid) and the price paid for the produce. That cost is undetermined.
Recommendation:	All purchases in excess of \$20,000 should be bid in accordance with the above statute.

- <u>Criteria</u>: Under the compliance criteria set forth for procurement of equipment with federal funds, the same State policies and procedures used for procurements from non-federal funds shall be used. LA Revised Statute 38:2212.1 (state bid law) requires the advertisement and letting of lowest responsible bidder for the purchase of materials and supplies in excess of \$20,000 paid out of public funds. Purchases of software can satisfy the state bid law by undergoing an RFP process.
- <u>Condition</u>: The School Board's Special Education program purchased educational software without undergoing an RFP process. The cost of the software was approximately \$28,000.
- Effect: The School Board is out of compliance with the statute referenced to above. As a result, the School Board may not be receiving the lowest price for its goods and services.
- <u>Questioned Costs:</u> Undetermined. The questioned cost would be the differences between the bid or quoted price and the price paid. The price paid did not appear to be unreasonable.
- <u>Recommendation</u>: The School Board should adopt a policy regarding the purchase of educational software products that should include an RFP process.
- Current Status: Resolved.

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INDEPENDENT ACCOUNTANTS' REPORT ON APPLYING AGREED-UPON PROCEDURES

To the Members of the East Feliciana Parish School Board

We have performed the procedures included in the Louisiana Governmental Audit Guide and enumerated below, which were agreed to by the management of East Feliciana Parish School Board and the Legislative Auditor, State of Louisiana, solely to assist users in evaluating management's assertions about the performance and statistical data accompanying the annual financial statements of East Feliciana Parish School Board and to determine whether the specified schedules are free of obvious errors and omissions as provided by the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) Bulletin. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was performed in accordance with standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and applicable standards of Government Auditing Standards. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of the specified users of the report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

Our procedures and findings relate to the accompanying schedules. We did not audit the information and express no opinion on it. Our procedures and findings are as follows:

General Fund Instructional and Support Expenditures and Certain Local Revenue Sources (Schedule 1)

<u>Procedure #1</u>

P&N selected a random sample of 25 transactions and reviewed supporting documentation to determine if the sampled expenditures/revenues are recorded correctly and are reported within the following amounts reported in the schedule as appropriate:

- Total general fund expenditures
- Total general fund equipment expenditures
- Total local taxation revenue
- Total local earnings on investment in real property
- Total state revenue in lieu of taxes
- Nonpublic textbook revenue
- Nonpublic transportation revenue

<u>Results of procedure # 1</u>

In performing the testing on the sample of expenditures/revenues, we noted no exceptions to this procedure.

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Education Levels of Public School Staff (Schedule 2)

Procedure #2

We reconciled the total number of full-time classroom teachers per the schedule "Experience of Public Principals and Full-time Classroom Teachers" (Schedule 4) to the combined total number of full-time classroom teachers per this schedule and to school board supporting payroll records as of October 1st.

Results of Procedure #2

No differences were noted between the number of full-time classroom teachers per schedule 4 and schedule 2, or between the schedules and the Oct. 1 payroll records.

<u>Procedure #3</u>

We reconciled the combined total of principals and assistant principals per the schedule "Experience of Public Principals and Full-time Classroom Teachers" (Schedule 4) to the combined total of principals and assistant principals per this schedule and to the School Board's supporting payroll records as of October 1st.

Results of procedure # 3

No differences were noted between the number of principals and assistant principals per schedule 4 and schedule 2, or between the schedules and the Oct. 1 payroll records.

Procedure # 4

We obtained a list of full-time teachers, principals, and assistant principals by classification as of October 1st and as reported on the schedule. We traced a random sample of 25 teachers to the individuals' personnel files to determine if the individual's education level was properly classified on the schedule.

Results of Procedure # 4:

In our sample of 25 employees, all 25 employees files reviewed agreed to the degree level reported in Schedule 2.

Number and Type of Public Schools (Schedule 3)

Procedure # 5

We obtained a list of schools by type as reported on the schedule. We compared the list to the schools and grade levels as reported on the School Food Service application.

Results of Procedure # 5

We noted no discrepancies between the schools as listed in the "Class Size Data Report" and the list of schools on the application.

Experience of Public Principals and Full-time Classroom Teachers (Schedule 4)

Procedure #6

We obtained a list of full-time teachers, principals, and assistant principals by classification as of October 1 and as reported on the schedule and traced the same sample used in procedure 4 to the individuals' personnel files to determined if the individuals' experience was properly classified on the schedule.

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<u>Results of Procedure # 6</u>

In our sample of 25 employees, no discrepancies existed between the aforementioned listing and the schedule.

Public Staff Data (Schedule 5)

Procedure # 7

We obtained a list of all classroom teachers including their base salary, extra compensation, and ROTC or rehired retiree status as well as full-time equivalency status as reported on the schedule. From the list, a random sample of 25 teachers was selected. For the teachers selected, we observed the individuals' personnel file and the District's salary schedule and determined if the individual's salary, extra compensation, and full-time equivalency status were properly included on the schedule.

Results of procedure #7

In our sample of 25 teachers, we found no discrepancies between the individual's personnel file and the District's salary schedule and the amounts reported on Schedule 5.

Procedure #8

We recalculated the average salaries and full-time equivalents reported in the schedule to determine mathematical accuracy.

Results of procedure #8

We noted no differences between the averages reported on the schedule and our calculations.

Class Size Characteristics (Schedule 6)

Procedure #9

We obtained a "class size data report" which was obtained from the same data source for which schedule 6 was prepared. From this "class size data report", we selected a random sample of 10 classes to the October 1st roll books for those classes and determined if the class was properly classified on the schedule.

<u>Results of Procedure #9</u>

Of the 10 classes selected, we noted the following differences in 6 classes between the roll book counts and the number reported in Schedule 6:

In planning and performing our audit of the financial statements of the East Feliciana Parish School Board (the School Board) for the year ended June 30, 2010, we considered the School Board's internal controls and compliance with certain financial laws and regulations to determine our auditing procedures for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the financial statements and not to provide assurance on the internal control structure or an opinion on compliance.

However, during our audit, we became aware of a an instance of noncompliance that we consider to be immaterial to the financial statements that is required to be reported to management of the School Board and those charged with governance under *Government Auditing Standards*. Our determination does not constitute a legal opinion of non-compliance. This letter does not affect our report dated March 12, 2011 on the financial statements of the School Board.

Louisiana Bid Law

Criteria:

LA RS 38:2211 et seq. requires public works in excess of \$150,000 to undergo the bid processes and to be awarded to the lowest qualified bidder. The statute and related Attorney General Opinions are written to encourage open competition, without bias toward any vendor or the appearance thereof.

Condition:

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The School Board purchased several portable buildings in October of 2009. While the School Board underwent the bid process, circumstances surrounding the process may indicate that the bid law was violated due to the winning vendor possibly having an advantage over other bidders. The specifications of the portable buildings to be purchased were provided by the Company that won the contract. Additionally, the portable building was temporarily stored on the School Board's property while the bid process took place.

Additionally, a flaw in the receiving mechanism for the bids may have resulted in two bids being submitted after the bid submission deadline imposed by the Board. The law generally requires that purchases be re-bid when such mishaps occur.

Recommendation:

The School Board should be mindful that all bid purchases must be free and open to all available qualified vendors without bias or the appearance thereof. The School Board should seek counsel from its attorney regarding remedies to this violation, if it is determined that such a violation actually occurred.

Management's Response:

It is the position of the East Feliciana Parish School Board that the bid process referenced above met all the requirements of the LA RS 38:2211. The winning vendor had no advantage over the other bidders as evidenced by the following:

- The Bidding period started on September 8, 2009 and expired on October 14, 2009. The Bid Opening Committee meeting was scheduled for 1:30 PM, October 14, 2009.
- October 14, 2009
 - o Due to a delay in members arriving, the meeting began at 1:36:30 p.m.
 - The sole hand-delivered bid was received on Wednesday, October 14, 2009, at 11:18 a.m., was opened and read aloud at 1:38 p.m.
 - The online e-bid search through our e-bid online service, Central Auction House, was reviewed at 1:48:21 p.m., "No Bid Activity Found" was seen to be displayed.
 - After a discussion regarding the sole received bid, at 1:55:16 p.m., the Bid Opening Committee voted to have the Superintendent use his discretion, which had been authorized at a prior Board meeting on October 6, 2009, on behalf of the East Feliciana School Board in awarding the bid to the lowest responsive bidder.
 - At 3.15 p.m., FedEx delivered a Bid package from M-Space Holdings to the School Board Office. This package was not opened since it arrived after the deadline for receiving bids.
- October 15, 2009
 - At 9:02 a.m., the School Board received a telephone call from M-Space Holdings that M-Space was in receipt of an email of an acknowledgement that their bid had been received by Central Auction House on October 13, 2009 at 4:36: 16 p.m., which was prior to the deadline for submitting bids. M-Space faxed a copy of this acknowledgement to the School Board at 9:17 a.m.
 - o This message from M-Space prompted the Superintendent to do another online search of the Central Auction House in order to determine if other bids had been received which had not appeared during the Bid Opening Committee meeting.
 - At 9:20 a.m., the Superintendent checked the website and found two (2) e-bids had been posted, which were not present on October 14, 2009. According to the electronic receipt verification, both bids were received prior to the bid deadline.
 - The online bids were opened, read and printed. Both bids adhered to the requested specifications of the bid package and were significantly higher than the bid read on October 14, 2009.
 - o The contract was awarded to the lowest qualified bidder.

Based on the timeline and information provided above, management had determined that the bid process was in compliance with Louisiana state statute and school board policy.

All eligible bids were considered in the process (timely submission and met bid specifications); therefore, a re-bid was not deemed necessary. Furthermore, since multiple bids were received meeting all of the required specifications, this clearly shows that the specifications were generic enough that any vendor could have participated in the bid process.



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Additionally, the temporary storage of the modular buildings on School Board property was to the School Board's advantage. Management allowed the modular buildings to be placed on School Board property so the Members of the School Board, the Superintendent, as well as the Maintenance staff were able to inspect the modular buildings to determine if they would meet the needs of the school system. Management determined that the value received for being able to inspect the modular buildings was comparable to the fee that would have been assessed for use of the property. The vendor moved the modular buildings to the School Board property at their expense and was aware the contract would be bid on and had agreed to move the modular buildings at their expense if they were not the low bidder.

Lastly, according to State Statute, the School Board was not required to bid the modular buildings since the estimated price of the used modular building was under \$150,000. The bid process was initiated by management of the School Board in order to follow its own policy whose limit was \$100,000 at the time and to insure the School Board gets the best price, which is believed to have been achieved.

In the future, the School Board will insure that all bid purchases will be free and open to all available qualified vendors without bias or the appearance thereof.

We have already discussed this comments and suggestion with management, and we will be pleased to discuss it in further detail at your convenience. We would also welcome any opportunity to perform any additional study of this matter or to assist you in implementing the recommendation. We would also like to thank the School Board staff for their patience and cooperation with us during the performance of the audit.

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
