Report on the Financial Statements

We have audited the accompanying financial statements of The Einstein Group, Inc., d/b/a Einstein Charter School (the School), which comprise the statement of financial position as of June 30, 2014, the related statements of activities and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

Management's Responsibility for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America; this includes the design, implementation, and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

Auditor's Responsibility

Our responsibility is to express an opinion on these financial statements based on our audit. We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States. Those standards require that we plan and perform the audit to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements are free from material misstatement.

An audit involves performing procedures to obtain audit evidence about the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements. The procedures selected depend on the auditor's judgment, including the assessment of the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error. In making those risk assessments, the auditor considers internal control relevant to the entity's preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the entity's internal control. Accordingly, we express no such opinion. An audit also includes evaluating the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluating the overall presentation of the financial statements.

We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

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Opinion

In our opinion, the financial statements referred to above present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of the School as of June 30, 2014, and the changes in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended, in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Other Matters

Other Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The schedule of board of directors is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by Office of Management and Budget Circular A-133, *Audits of States, Local Governments, and Non-Profit Organizations*, is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is also not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America. In our opinion, the information is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

The Performance and Statistical Data, included as Schedules 1 through 9, is not a required part of the basic financial statements, but is supplementary information required by Louisiana State Law. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. We have applied certain limited procedures, which are described in the Independent Accountant's Report on Applying Agreed-Upon Procedures. However, we did not audit this information and, accordingly, express no opinion on it.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated August 28, 2014, on our consideration of the School's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements, and other matters. The purpose of that report is to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering the School's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

Notes to Financial Statements

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

The Einstein Group, Inc. (the Corporation) was created as a non-profit corporation under the laws of the State of Louisiana on January 27, 2004. The Corporation applied to the Orleans Parish School Board to operate a Type I charter school. The Corporation does business as Einstein Charter School (the School). On October 12, 2004, the Orleans Parish School Board approved the charter of The Einstein Group, Inc. to create the Einstein Charter School. In July 2011, the School received a 6 year extension of the charter. The School serves eligible students in pre-kindergarten through eighth grade.

During the year ended June 30, 2013, the School amended its charter agreement to include two locations. This was due to the School taking over the operations of a nearby charter school location. Effective July 1, 2013, the Corporation began operations of the new campus.

The School leases its campuses rent free from the Louisiana Recovery School District.

A summary of the School's significant accounting policies consistently applied in the preparation of the accompanying financial statements follows:

Financial Statement Presentation

The School follows the guidance of the *Not-for-Profit Entities* Topic of the Financial Accounting Standards Board (FASB) Accounting Standards Codification (ASC). The School is required to report information regarding its financial position and activities according to three classes of net assets: unrestricted, temporarily restricted, and permanently restricted. In addition, the School is required to present a statement of cash flows.

The School also follows the guidance of the *Not-for-Profit Entities* Topic of the FASB ASC, whereby contributions received are recorded as unrestricted, temporarily restricted, or permanently restricted support depending on the existence and/or nature of any donor restrictions. Restricted net assets are reclassified to unrestricted net assets upon satisfaction of the donor-imposed time or purpose restrictions. Restricted contributions, for which the restriction is met in the same year, are classified as unrestricted.

Basis of Accounting

Basis of accounting refers to when revenues and expenses are recognized in the accounts and reported on the financial statements. The financial statements of the School are prepared on the accrual basis of accounting whereby revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Note 1. Summary of Significant Accounting Policies (Continued)

Revenues

The School's primary source of funding is through the State Public School Funding and the Orleans Parish School Board which made up 79% of its funding. State and federal grants are on a cost reimbursement basis. An accrual is made when eligible expenses are incurred.

Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Fixed assets are recorded at historical cost or estimated historical cost if historical cost is not available. Betterments that naturally add to the value of related assets or materially extend the useful lives of assets are capitalized. Normal building maintenance and minor equipment purchases are included as expenses of the School.

Income Taxes

The School is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the School's tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income.

Statement of Cash Flows

For purposes of the statement of cash flows, the School considers all investments purchased with an original maturity of three months or less to be cash equivalents.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect certain reported amounts and disclosures. Accordingly, actual results could differ from those estimates.

Concentrations

The School received 79% of its revenues in the year ended June 30, 2014, from the State Public School Funding and the Orleans Parish School Board, subject to its charter school contract with the School Board, and 9% of its funding from the federal government.

As noted earlier, the School is leasing its building from the Louisiana Recovery School District rent free. Should this lease not be extended further, it would have an unfavorable impact to the School.

Note 2. Cash and Cash Equivalents

The School's cash and cash equivalents (book balances) at June 30, 2014, were \$3,144,039, which are stated at cost and approximate market.

Note 3. Restriction on Assets

Temporarily restricted net assets are restricted by donors for specific programs, purposes, or to assist specific departments of the School. These restrictions are considered to expire when payments for restricted purposes are made. None of the temporarily restricted net assets are time-restricted by donors.

Temporarily restricted net assets in the amount of \$50,000 at June 30, 2014 are restricted to support the purchase of promethean boards.

Note 4. Grants Receivable

As of June 30, 2014, grants receivable totaled \$212,575, which is a combination of state and federal grants passed through the Orleans Parish School Board. This receivable has been discounted based on management's experience with the collection of grants from the Orleans Parish School Board. However, the stated balance is considered to be fully collectible.

Note 5. Fixed Assets

Depreciation expense for the year ended June 30, 2014, was \$39,578. Depreciation is calculated using the straight-line method with useful lives of 5 years.

All assets acquired with Louisiana Department of Education funds are owned by the School while used in the purpose for which they were purchased. The Louisiana Department of Education, however, has a reversionary interest in these assets. Should the charter not be renewed, title in any assets purchased with those funds will transfer to the appropriate agency.

Note 6. Accrued Liabilities

As of June 30, 2014, the School has recorded accrued liabilities of \$451,668. The entire amount is for employee salaries and other related employee benefits.

Note 7. Retirement Plan

Certain employees of the School participate in the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana (TRSL). The TRSL is a cost-sharing, multiple-employer defined benefit pension plan administered by a separate board of trustees. Pertinent information relative to the plan follows.

Plan Description

The TRSL provides retirement benefits as well as disability and survivor benefits. Ten years of service credit are required to become vested for retirement benefits, and five years to become vested for disability and survivor benefits. Benefits are established and amended by state statute. The TRSL issues a publicly available financial report that includes financial statements and required supplementary information for the TRSL. That report may be obtained by writing to the Teachers' Retirement System of Louisiana, P.O. Box 94123, Baton Rouge, LA 70804-9123.

Funding Policy

Plan members are required to contribute 8% of their annual covered salary. The School is required to contribute at an actuarially determined rate. During the year ended June 30, 2014, the employer contribution rate was 27.20%. The employer contribution rate for the majority of each of the years ended June 30, 2013 and 2012, was 24.50% and 23.70%, respectively. Member contributions and employer contributions for the TRSL are established by state law, and rates are established by the Public Retirement System's Actuarial Committee. The School's contribution to the plan for the years ended June 30, 2014, 2013, and 2012, was \$1,461,877, \$661,474, and \$639,557, respectively, which was equal to the required contribution.

Note 8. Uncertain Income Taxes

The School's 2010, 2011, and 2012 tax returns were filed appropriately. As of August 28, 2014, the School had not filed their 2013 tax return. The School recognizes interest and penalties, if any, related to unrecognized tax benefits in income tax expense. The School's tax filings are subject to audit by various taxing authorities. The School's open audit periods are 2010 through 2012. Management has evaluated the School's tax position and concluded that the School has taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustment to the financial statements to comply with the provisions of this guidance.

Note 9. Subsequent Events

Management has evaluated subsequent events through the date that the financial statements were available to be issued, August 28, 2014, and determined that no events occurred that require disclosure. No subsequent events occurring after this date have been evaluated for inclusion in these financial statements.

We have performed the procedures included in the *Louisiana Governmental Audit Guide* and enumerated below, which were agreed to by the management of The Einstein Group, Inc. (the School) and the Legislative Auditor, State of Louisiana, solely to assist users in evaluating management's assertions about the performance and statistical data accompanying the annual financial statements of The Einstein Group, Inc. and to determine whether the specified schedules are free of obvious errors and omissions as provided by the Board of Elementary and Secondary Education (BESE) Bulletin. The School's management is responsible for the School's data. This agreed-upon procedures engagement was conducted in accordance with attestation standards established by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and *Government Auditing Standards*. The sufficiency of these procedures is solely the responsibility of those parties specified in the report. Consequently, we make no representation regarding the sufficiency of the procedures described below either for the purpose for which this report has been requested or for any other purpose.

Our procedures and findings that relate to the accompanying schedules of supplemental information are as follows:

General Fund Instructional and Support Expenditures and Certain Local Revenue Sources (Schedule 1)

1. We selected a random sample of 25 transactions and reviewed supporting documentation to determine if the sampled expenditures/revenues are classified correctly and are reported in the proper amounts for each of the following amounts reported on the schedule:
 - Total General Fund Instructional Expenditures
 - Total General Fund Equipment Expenditures
 - Total Local Taxation Revenue
 - Total Local Earnings on Investment in Real Property
 - Total State Revenue in Lieu of Taxes
 - Nonpublic Textbook Revenue
 - Nonpublic Transportation Revenue

Findings:

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Education Levels of Public School Staff (Schedule 2)

2. We reconciled the total number of full time classroom teachers per the schedule "Experience of Public Principals, Assistant Principals and Full Time Classroom Teachers" (Schedule 4) to the combined total number of full time classroom teachers per this schedule and to School supporting payroll records as of October 1st.
3. We reconciled the combined total of principals and assistant principals per the schedule "Experience of Public Principals, Assistant Principals and Full Time Classroom Teachers" (Schedule 4) to the combined total of principals and assistant principals per this schedule.
4. We obtained a list of principals, assistant principals and full time classroom teachers by classification as of October 1st and as reported on the schedule. We traced 25 of the teachers to the individual's personnel file to determine if the individual's education level was properly classified on the schedule.

Findings:

3 of the 25 teachers' education levels as reported on the internally prepared schedule did not agree to the personnel file. Schedule 2, presented on page 17, has been corrected.

Management's Response:

Beginning with the 2014 - 2015 school year, management will require proof of education level, such as diploma or certificate.

Number and Type of Public Schools (Schedule 3)

5. We obtained a list of schools by type as reported on the schedule. We compared the list to the schools and grade levels as reported on the Title I Grants to Local Educational Agencies (CFDA 84.010) application and/or the National School Lunch Program (CFDA 10.555) application.

Findings:

Experience of Public Principals, Assistant Principals and Full Time Classroom Teachers (Schedule 4)

6. We obtained a list of principals, assistant principals and full time classroom teachers by classification as of October 1st and as reported on the schedule and traced the same sample used in procedure 4 to the individual's personnel file and determined if the individual's experience was properly classified on the schedule.

Findings:

Of the 25 employees selected for testing, 4 of the teachers' personnel files showed years of experience that did not agree to the experience level classification shown on the internally prepared report. Schedule 4, presented on page 19, has been corrected.

Management's Response:

Beginning with the 2014 - 2015 school year, management will obtain formal written documentation from each employee specifically noting their years of experience.

Public School Staff Data (Schedule 5)

7. We obtained a list of all classroom teachers including their base salary, extra compensation and ROTC or rehired retiree status as well as full time equivalents as reported on the schedule and traced a random sample of 25 teachers to the individual's personnel file and determined if the individual's salary, extra compensation, and full time equivalents were properly included on the schedule.
8. We recalculated the average salaries and full time equivalents reported on the schedule.

Findings:

Class Size Characteristics (Schedule 6)

9. We obtained a list of classes by school, school type and class size as reported on the schedule and reconciled school type classifications to Schedule 3 data, as obtained in procedure 5. We then traced a random sample of 10 classes to the October 1st roll books for those classes and determined if the class was properly classified on the schedule.
